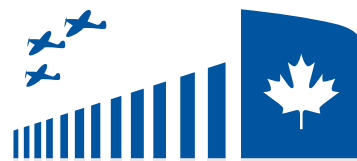

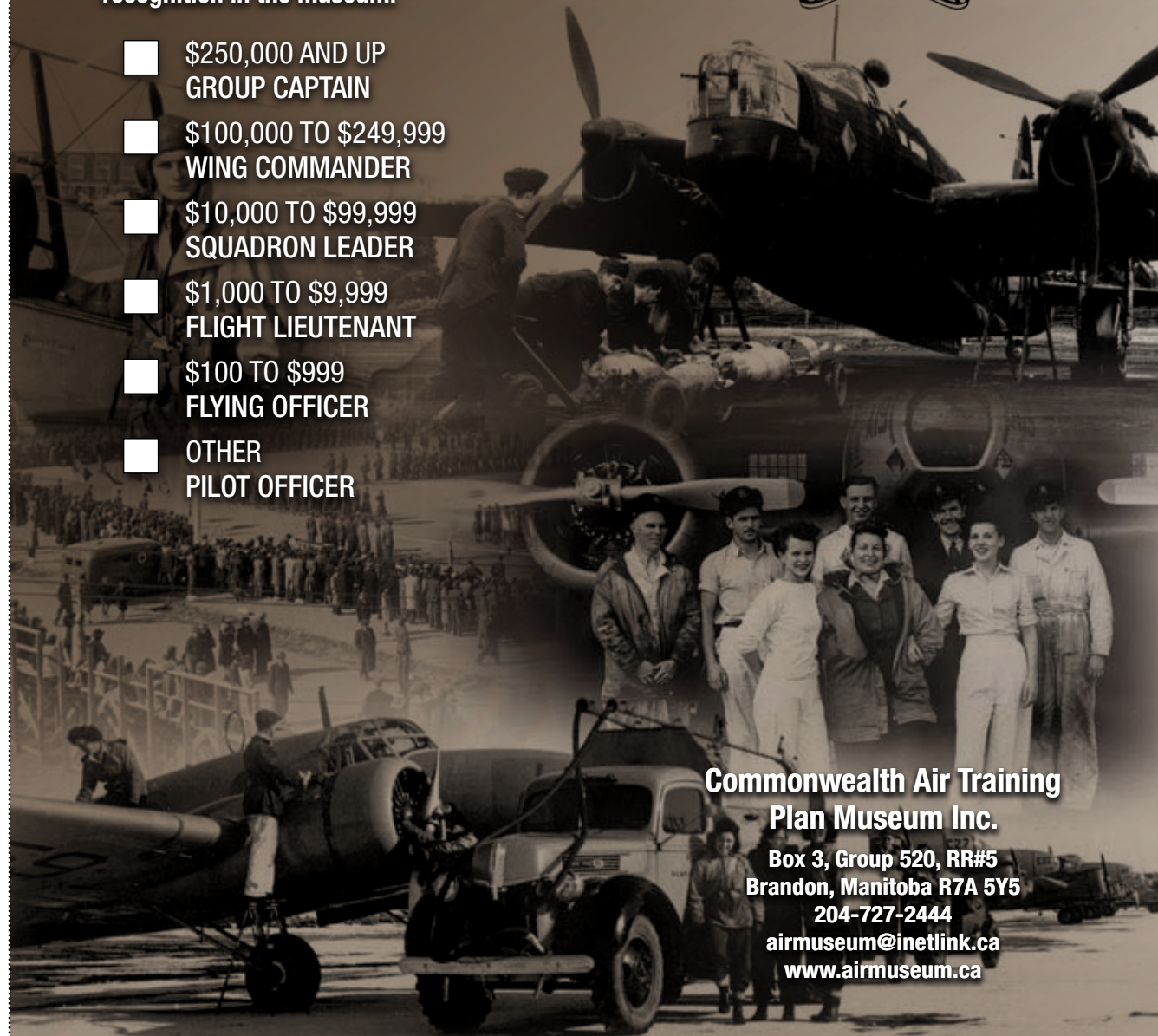

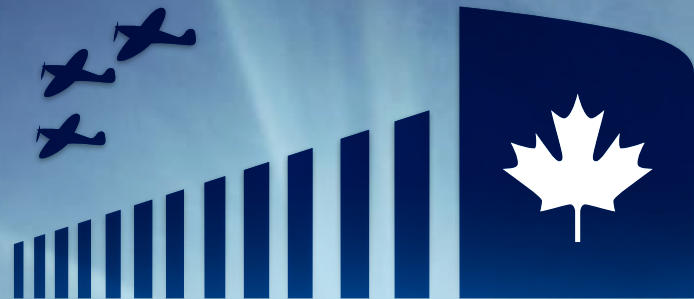

RCAF WWII MEMORIAL

In 2010, the Memorial Project Committee of the Commonwealth Air Training Plan Museum began an ambitious project to create a permanent public tribute to all members of the Royal Canadian Air Force and all Canadians serving in any Commonwealth air force who lost their lives during World War II. The RCAF WWII Memorial, to be located on the grounds of the Commonwealth Air Training Plan Museum at Brandon, Manitoba, will also pay tribute to Royal Air Force, Royal Australian Air Force, and Royal New Zealand Air Force personnel who lost their lives in or near Canada during this period.

The RCAF WWII Memorial will be impressive in both size and scope — a black granite wall approximately 300 feet in length containing the names of over 19,000 fatalities, with a larger-than-life bronze statue representing the fallen. It will serve as lasting recognition of the ultimate sacrifice made by BCATP members to the war effort.

The Memorial is estimated to cost in excess of one million dollars. With the support of individuals, organizations, businesses and governments, the Memorial will become a reality.

The public unveiling of the RCAF WWII Memorial is tentatively scheduled for August 2014, in conjunction with events to mark the 75th anniversary of the start of WWII.

The tribute will consist of black granite panels arranged to form a wall approximately 300 feet in length containing the names of over 19,000 fatalities.

British Commonwealth Air Training Plan

Roughly 70 years ago Canada was deeply immersed in the Second World War. Facism was threatening every democratic principle in the free world. It was a time of enormous sacrifice and extraordinary commitment for all of the Allied countries. The combined armed forces had a desperate need for a well-trained supply of air crew and support staff to fight the enemy's war in the air. Canada was chosen for the British Commonwealth countries' massive air training program known as the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan. It was a huge project — 231 training sites were built, 8,300 buildings and hangars constructed, over 200,000 young people trained. The training site at Brandon, Manitoba, is now the Commonwealth Air Training Plan Museum, a National Historic Site. It is a major commemoration of Canada's leadership in this wartime effort.
